EASTERN SAN JOAQUIN GROUNDWATER AUTHORITY Board Meeting Minutes April 13, 2022

I. Call to Order/Pledge of Allegiance & Safety Announcement/Roll Call

The Eastern San Joaquin Groundwater Authority (GWA) Board Teleconference meeting convened, and Chairman Chuck Winn called the meeting to order, via the online Microsoft Teams Meeting platform, at 9:06 a.m. on April 13, 2022. The meeting was Teleconference only.

Chairman Winn led the agenda.

Mrs. Kristy Smith with San Joaquin County conducted the roll call.

In attendance were Chairman Chuck Winn; Vice Chairman Mel Panizza; Secretary Kris Balaji; Directors Alan Nakanishi, David Breitenbucher, Dan Wright, Gary Tofanelli, Myron Blanton, Mike Henry, Tom Flinn, Eric Thorburn, John Herrick, Robert Holmes. Director Jeremiah Mecham was also in attendance but arrived after roll call was taken.

II. Scheduled Items

A. Discussion/Action Items:

1. Approval of the March 9, 2022 Meeting Minutes

Chairman Winn called for the approval of minutes of the meeting on March 9, 2022. There were no comments by the GWA Board members and no comments by the public.

Motion:

Director Robert Holmes moved, and Director John Herrick second, approval of the March 9, 2022 minutes. Roll Call Vote was conducted, the motion passed.

2. Discussion and Possible Action to Adopt Resolution R-22-XX Determining to Conduct Meetings Using Teleconferencing Pursuant to Government Code 54953 as Amended by AB 361

Chairman Winn requested input from Mr. Rod Attebery with Neumiller & Beardslee, regarding the status of AB361 and teleconferencing. Mr. Attebery addressed the possibility of a renewal of the teleconference policy via the State. Mr. Attebery noted that other agencies are conducting hybrid meetings and it was his recommendation to approve the resolution for possible future teleconference or hybrid meetings, as unsure of where the State will land after their April 14th meeting. additional discussion was had on the Ag Center meeting facility and their electronic capabilities for hybrid meetings.

Chairman Winn asked for a motion to approve the Resolution Determining to Conduct Meetings Using Teleconferencing Pursuant to Government Code 54953 as Amended by AB 361.

Motion:

Director Robert Holmes moved, and Director Dan Wright second, adoption of the resolution R-22-XX. Roll Call Vote was conducted, the motion passed unanimously.

3. GWA Committee Assignments

Mr. Matt Zidar with San Joaquin County provided an overview of the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) and Legal/Policy Committee member volunteers, noting that if other GSA representatives wished to participate, they should voice their interest.

Mr. Attebery noted that no action by the Board is needed, as the JPA identifies that Ad Hoc Committee appointments are done through the Chairman. Additionally noted was the fact that now would be the appropriate time for interested parties to represent their GSA and voice their interest in participation.

It was noted that additional GSA member representatives are being sought in addition to the regular TAC member roster. The group suggested that interested parties be provided a list of the TAC members for reference. Director Mike Henry requested to be added to the Legal/Policy Committee.

4. FY 2022-23 Budget Discussion, Approach, Programs, and Schedule

Mr. Zidar provided the Board a brief overview of the Fiscal Year 2022/2023 Budget, noting that development of the budget is in progress and input is requested. Mr. Zidar advised that budget development would continue into May and go through the TAC for input. Mr. Zidar questioned the formation of an Ad Hoc Budget Committee as done in previous years. No definitive response from Board provided. Mr. Zidar discussed the GWA Programs and Projects, noting those that are regular or ongoing and those that are a special study or service. Mr. Zidar opened the discussion for input and thoughts.

Director Tom Flinn expressed the desire for discussions on funding sources, specifically Zone 2 funds, as part of the budget discussions. Mr. Zidar provided some details on the use of Zone 2 funds pertaining to the GWA, the Tracy Subbasin and monitoring networks, noting the need to look at the use of Zone 2 fund strategically to go over the 20-year plan. Mr. Zidar advised that the Zone 2 fund/budget will be taken before the Advisory Water Commission at their May meeting, for discussion.

Director John Herrick noted the need to have conversations with the ILRP Water Quality Coalition before budgeting for monitoring well efforts, as there may be overlap in efforts. Director Herrick additionally questioned if there is a modest expected increase in GSA contribution or a more substantial increase. Mr. Zidar noted some potential increases but advised the Board that additional discussions and work needed to be done before a definitive increase amount could be provided.

5. DWR Comments and GWA Response – Status Report and Direction

Mr. Zidar provided a status report of the work being done in regard to the GWA responses to DWR comments on the GSP and the direction moving forward. Mr. Zidar noted that an initial meeting with DWR was had on April 4th and the final workplan and schedule is being developed currently. Additionally noted were the joint TAC and Legal/Policy Committee meeting to be held on April 14th and additionally in May and the first part of June, with GWA and GSA action in June. Mr. Zidar noted that the GWA comments are due to DWR by July 27th and will require that each GSA adopt the responses and GSP updates. Discussion was had on the timing of GSA Board Meetings to the needed adoption of updates and responses. Mr. Zidar advised that a GWA motion and approval is needed to submit the responses by the July deadline, while the individual GSA adoptions are required but not necessary by the July GWA Board Meeting.

6. Funding and Financing Options

Chairman Winn provided the group an overview of funding and financing options for water related projects, in the form of a sales tax measure to be taken to ballot in November. Chairman Winn noted that documents went out to the group for review and to prompt discussions within the group regarding needed water projects and the funding mechanism for those projects. Chairman Winn briefly reviewed the documents, noting the white paper document contained 2019 Fresno State study and discussed funding resources and options in the form of ballot measures and how they fared. Chairman Winn noted that he is not looking for an endorsement today, but rather input and thoughts from the group. Additionally, he has already met with County Counsel and has had preliminary discussions on the ballot measure efforts. Chairman Winn noted that constituents are asking for resolutions to problems and decisions regarding emergency orders and guidelines, they do not want to hear that nothing can be done and are satisfied when efforts being made to solve their problems. Chairman Winn added that the information provided today will allow for a mechanism to share with the public, allowing them to make decisions on their future related to water issues. Chairman Winn advised that he is requesting discussions over the next month and would like to bring before Board in August for endorsement for the November ballot.

Director John Herrick noted his support of the idea and questioned any leeway in the meaning of Water Infrastructure being used on the potential measure. Could the funds from the measure be a potential funding source for future routing and dredging projects or just new water supply projects? Chairman Winn noted there is the ability for flexibility, to review and adjust verbiage.

Ms. Mary Elizabeth with the Sierra Club noted that for the sake of Disadvantaged Communities (DAC) she would like to see a Property Tax rather than a Sales Tax measure, as this will assess individual property owners with more ability to pay additional tax assessments. Director Dan Wright noted he agreed with the suggested Property Tax or Parcel Tax route, as sales taxes hurt the poor more than it would the middle- or upper-class communities.

Director Tom Flinn noted that NSJWCD is targeting a June ballot measure with a water use tax of their rate payers, allowing for funding of SGMA projects. Director Flinn additionally questioned the boundary of proposed measure, the specific projects of interest, and who the governing body would be.

Chairman Winn discussed the potential revenue with approximately 800,000 residences in San Joaquin County, noting that with a sales tax, people with the ability to purchase products would be paying more than people with lesser means to purchase products. Chairman Winn noted that the assessment needs to be proportional across the County and that if the measure were to move forward, there would be a portion of funds to assist the DAC.

The consensus of the group was there is a desperate need for funding, as everyone's needs require funding and projects need to be done to protect and secure the future of San Joaquin County water. There is a great need to move forward and do something like this to secure funding for the future.

III. Staff and DWR Reports

A. Staff Reports

Mr. Zidar provided a brief overview of a DWR report showing drought conditions and updates, noting it was just a snapshot of the dire conditions we are facing.

1. Legislation

Mr. Zidar provided an overview of the Legislative resources and firms available and used for maintaining up to date information on activities in Sacramento and Washington, noting that when items arise that will

affect the GWA, he will provide the details for the group to review and discuss. Ms. Elizabeth noted she found some information interesting from the NGO and Environmentalist stance. Ms. Elizabeth pointed out AB2201 by Bennet and provided link in the chat.

2. Executive order N-7-22

Mr. Zidar discussed the Executive Order N-7-22, included in the agenda package, noting specifically No. 9 of the Order, which states permits for a new or for altering existing groundwater wells in the basin must be approved by the GSA for meeting sustainability and be approved by Environmental Health Department (EHD) as not interfering with existing wells. Ms. Kirin Virk of San Joaquin County Counsel provided additional detail on the Executive Order and noted that the County is moving to get a definitive process in place to meet the expectations of the Executive Order. It was noted that there are two paths to comply with the order, through GSA and through EHD.

Discussion was had on proposed wells being near another GSA boundary and if those surrounding GSAs have a way to comment on a proposed new well. It was advised that there is not current process for public review. Mr. Zidar noted that the entire Executive Order N-7-22 document is included in the agenda package and worth review, for other sections that do apply to GSAs. It was additionally noted that it is a good idea to get out AB2201 for GSA review and comment.

3. Grants and Funding

Mr. Zidar provided a brief overview and review of the grants and funding for the GWA, noting specifically the adjustment required by DWR to the spending plan and projects for the SGMA Implementation Round 1 Grant as the amount was reduced to 7.6 million after application process.

B. DWR Report

Mr. Mattipohto Siltanen with California Department of Water Resources (DWR) provided an overview of the DWR report provided by Ms. Chelsea Spier, noting some of the items of importance being the following.

- A Fact Sheet on the Executive Order N-7-22 was sent via chat for review.
- Reminder to GSAs to update the DWR Portal with their Spring monitoring levels.
- Reminder of the continued AEM flights during April.
- There is a Watersmart Small Scale grant opportunity available, with an application due date of 4/28.
- Note that on March 11th DWR release their Groundwater Conditions Report for review.

IV. <u>Directors' Comments</u>

Mr. Scot Moody with SEWD requested letters of support from the GSAs, in regard to SEWD efforts to remove the rate cap for their area.

Mr. Zidar requested recommendation assistance from the GSAs in San Joaquin County Public Work's efforts to fill Engineer vacancies.

V. Public Comment

Ms. Mary Elizabeth with the Sierra Club commented that she provided a link in the chat box related to the SAFER funding opportunities, noting the need to encourage County agencies like Environmental Health and Office of Emergency Service to seek out this funding source to assist with outreach, organization, and mitigation for domestic and small well water systems. Ms. Elizabeth additionally noted her request for the meeting recordings to be posted on the website on a regular basis, for public viewing.





USBR: WaterSMART Drought Grants for Fiscal Year 2023

USBR has a number of grants to fund drought response including contingency planning (applications due April 14), resiliency projects (**applications due June 15**) and emergency response. More information can be found here.

ICARP Grant Programs

Three new grant programs were authorized under the 2021 State Climate Budget to fund local, regional, and tribal **climate adaptation and resilience efforts** across the state. <u>More information including registration for listening session webinars can be found here.</u>

- The ICARP Adaptation Planning Grant Program will invest \$25 million over multiple funding rounds for local, regional, and tribal governments to support climate adaptation and resilience planning activities.
- The ICARP Regional Resilience Planning and Implementation Grant Program will invest \$250 million over multiple funding rounds to scale regional climate resilience solutions.
- The ICARP Extreme Heat and Community Resilience Grant Program will support local and regional heat adaptation by investing \$100 million in extreme heat and urban heat island mitigation activities.

It is the State's strategic plan for managing and developing California's water resources. The Electronic Annual Report (EAR) to the State Water Resources Control Board's Division of Drinking Water (DDW) on the operation of your public water system during the past year (2021) will be released on March 21, 2022. Once it is released, the 2021 EAR is due to be submitted by May 21, 2022.

DWR and the State Water Resources Control Board have released <u>principles and strategies for groundwater management and drinking water wells</u>. The document provides a framework for the development of drought-resistant communities. Approximately 82 percent of Californians rely on groundwater for some portion of their drinking water or other household uses. A Spanish version of the draft is available.

DWR Released California's Groundwater Update 2020 (formerly Bulletin 118) and California's Groundwater Live Online The Department of Water Resources (DWR) released the final California's Groundwater — Update 2020
(Bulletin-118), containing information on the condition of the State's groundwater, which is especially important with most of California facing ongoing drought conditions. DWR has also developed a companion web-based application called California's Groundwater Live (CalGW Live), leveraging the California Natural Resources
Agency Open Data Platform (Open Data) to improve the access and timeliness of statewide groundwater information. The easy-to-use interface will make many of the data sets used in CalGW Update 2020 available in an interactive map format that will be updated regularly for viewing and downloading. features added to domestic and irrigation well dashboards on CA Groundwater Live: The first new feature is a series of new interactive well density layers that summarize the number of domestic and irrigation well completion reports (WCRs) received by the Department over various time periods since 1977. The other new feature has added monthly well statistics for both domestic and irrigation types. This feature allows users to compare the number of new domestic and irrigation wells installed month-by-month since 1977.

OpenET makes tracking water use data easier with satellite data

A space-based tool is ready to help track water in the western U.S. Using data from satellites, <u>Open Evapotranspiration</u> (OpenET) gives farmers and other water users information on how much of their water loss ends up as evapotranspiration. Newly Submitted GSP's Open for 75 Day Public Comment Period

Groundwater sustainability plans that have recently been submitted to the Department are now posted on the DWR <u>SGMA Portal</u>. These plans are open to public comment for 75 days after the posted date. Below in the table are links to the submitted plans, counties they cover, and the public comment period end date. DWR Releases GSP Assessments for COD basins that submitted by January 2020

DWR has now released the assessment for all COD basins that submitted GSP's in January of 2020. The release of incomplete determination begins a 180 day timeline to correct identified deficiencies that that precluded approval. These assessments and notification letters, along with other pertinent information, can be viewed here-on-the-DWR SGMA Portal. The Department has updated the SGMA Portal's GSP Reporting System to allow the resubmission of incomplete GSPs and, if applicable, Coordination Agreements. Groundwater Conditions Report for Water Year 2021 Released

On March 11, 2022, the Department of Water Resources (DWR, Department) released <u>Groundwater Conditions</u> <u>Report – Water Year 2021</u>. The report summarizes groundwater conditions across California and includes information on groundwater levels, land subsidence, new well infrastructure, and dry well reports. The reported

information is based on available data from DWR databases, as of January 14, 2022. To view the latest groundwater conditions, please visit <u>California's Groundwater Live</u>.

Dry Well Reporting Site

There is a website available to report private wells going dry. Information reported to this site is intended to inform state and local agencies on drought impacts on household water supplies. The data reported on this site (excluding personal identifiable information) can be viewed on the SGMA data viewer or downloaded on the CNRA Atlas. Individuals or local agencies can report water shortages and a list of resources are included on the webpage. The reporting forms are available in both English and Spanish.

DWR is developing eight Proposition 68-funded technical projects

These projects include airborne electromagnetic surveys, improving groundwater elevation and quality monitoring networks, Statewide land use data collection, improved subsidence monitoring network, installing and maintaining stream gauges, maintaining and enhancing statewide well completion reports, managing and reporting sustainable groundwater information, and enhancing and maintaining DWR's modeling tools. - <u>AEM webpage</u> contains information on the how the process works, safety, schedule, data submission by GSAs, TAC, pilot study data and more. Public webinar was held June 8th 12:00 1:00, a recording can be viewed here and handouts can be downloaded here. Sonoma Valley Basins were surveyed in November, 2021 and North San Joaquin and Southern Sacramento surveys completed in April 2022.
- 2018 Statewide Crop Mapping data dataset builds on the 2014 and 2016 statewide crop mapping datasets DWR previously released and includes multi-cropping information. The 2018 dataset includes agricultural land use and urban boundaries for all 58 counties in California. Water year 2019 is planned to be released in 2022.
- InSAR subsidence data is now available <u>through January of 2022</u> and can be viewed on the <u>SGMA data viewer</u>. The updated GIS services and data reports are also available <u>online</u>. Future data will be released on a quarterly basis.
